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PERFORMER PROFILES: September 2012

Ramana Vieira & Ensemble Saturday September 1

Ramana Vieira sings Fado like it's never been sung before. Mundo Portuguese Magazine has called her "the new voice of Portuguese world music." The San Francisco Chronicle says that "no one in the United States is doing more to breathe new life into Fado." Fado means fate, and you can think of Fado as the Portuguese version of the blues, a heartfelt, haunting music full of despair and lost love. Ramana and her virtuoso ensemble play classics and originals, digging deep into traditional Fado and transforming it into something utterly current.

Ramana grew up in San Leandro in a family of Portuguese immigrants, singing along with her mother to the records of Amália Rodrigues, the Queen of Fado. "Amália Rodrigues is in my DNA," Ramana said in a recent interview, "but so is Kate Bush, and I started out in a new-wave band." She studied



voice and acting at the American Conservatory Theater in San Francisco and had Broadway aspirations—until a record producer recommended that she explore her Portuguese roots. Since then, she's released three albums, including her latest, *Lágrimas de Rainha* (Tears of a Queen), which *Billboard Magazine* praised for its "willingness to take chances" and "soulful, torchy performances." Her ensemble features Laura Boytz on cello, Jeffrey Luiz on guitar, Stephen LaPorta on percussion, & Alberto Ramirez on electric bass.

HoHLax Trio Wednesday September 5

Join the Hohlax Trio on a musical journey to Greece, from the backstreets of Pireus to the magical islands of the Aegean. With Jaime Smith on violin, Orestis Koletsos on bouzouki, and Apostolis Kounis on vocals, guitar, and oud, the trio plays a unique blend of traditional Greek music and contemporary urban riffs. The name Hohlax derives from Hohlakas, a beach on the island of Amorgos, where the band came together in 2007. Since then, they've played in Athens, Cyprus, and California, and are now returning for a second West Coast tour.

Jaime Smith grew up in Sacramento, studied violin at the New England Conservatory of Music, and won a Fulbright Scholarship to Greece, where she attended the National Conservatory and studied *makam*, a system of Greek and



Turkish melody types that provides a complex structure for composing and performing. Jamie has spent the past 12 years living in Greece, performing internationally and studying with Christos Tsiamoulis, the country's leading expert on *makam* theory. Orestis Koletsos, born in Paris and raised in Athens, began playing bouzouki at the age of 15 and has been performing, recording, and writing songs for more than a decade. Apostolis Kounis, from Larissa in central Greece, began singing and playing guitar at the age of 12, studied at the Modern School of Music in Thessaloniki, and went on to Athens to explore Byzantine music and harmony as well as the intricacies of the *oud*.

For an evening of entrancing Greek melodies, catch the Hohlax Trio at the Freight.

O'Brien Party of 7, Cahalen & Eli open Thursday September 6

Start with Tim O'Brien, Grammy-winning country and bluegrass virtuoso from West Virginia. Add his sister Mollie, herself a Grammy-winning singer based in Denver. Stir in Mollie's husband Rich, a brilliant musician in his own right. Then add Tim's sons, Jackson and Joel, and Mollie's daughters, Brigid and Lucy, and you have O'Brien Party of 7. Sprinkle with the secret ingredient—the music of Roger Miller—and enjoy a delicious musical feast.

Tim, who co-founded the pioneering bluegrass band Hot Rize in 1978, has recorded three



albums with Mollie and more than a dozen solo albums, including *Fiddler's Green*, Grammy winner in 2005 for best Traditional Folk Album. He's collaborated with Steve Martin, toured with Mark Knopfler, and written songs for such artists as Garth Brooks, Kathy Mattea, and the Dixie Chicks. Molly, who appears regularly on *A Prairie Home Companion* and Mountain Stage, has recorded eleven acclaimed albums. In the words of the *Washington Post*, "The precision of her phrasing, the smooth flow of her delivery, and the sheer beauty of her alto make her one of the best interpretive singers in American pop today."

Molly and Tim have long wanted to collaborate on a family project, and the music of Roger Miller (Famous for classics like "King of the Road" and "England Swings,") gave them a worthy focus. The result is *Reincarnation*, recorded at Tim's home studio in Nashville.

O'Brien Party of 7 + the songs of Roger Miller = 1 party you won't want to miss.

Cahalen & Eli open the show. When they played on *BBC Radio 2*, the host called their performance "quite extraordinary." Cahalen Morrison comes from the high desert country of northern New Mexico; Eli West is based in Seattle. Together, these two young musicians deliver exquisite harmonies and great musicianship on guitar, banjo, mandolin, and bouzouki. According to Tim O'Brien, "Cahalen & Eli are making music that the world needs."

World Music Journey, a benefit for the Tibetan Aid Project with Diana Stork, Diana Rowan, Portia Diwa, Daniel Berkman, Teed Rockwell, and Omkar Bhave Friday September 7

Come to the Freight tonight and treat yourself to enchanting harp performances, the soulful sound of the kora, and traditional Hindustani ragas-all for a benefit to preserve the endangered culture of Tibet.

Diana Stork is a Berkeley harpist of international renown who has performed for such diverse groups as the Lines Contemporary Ballet, the Maihar Orchestra of Maestro Ali Akbar Khan, and the Peace Ceremony of Thich Nhat Hahn at Grace Cathedral. Harpist Diana Rowan combines exquisite classical technique with a full immersion into folk traditions as farranging as her native Ireland, Eastern Europe, and Persia, the original birthplace of the harp. Bay Area native Portia Diwa plays traditional Celtic, Latin, and classical music as well as her own originals on a 36-string neo-Celtic lever harp and a 26-string "Harpsicle."



Daniel Berkman, based in San Francisco, plays guitar and kora, a 21-string West African lute, delving deeply into the traditional music of Senegal, Gambia, and Mali as well as composing his own other-worldly originals. Teed Rockwell is a professor at Sonoma State, a music critic for India Currents, and a devoted student of the Hindustani raga, which he performs on an instrument called the touchstyle veena, a guitar-like fretboard played by tapping the strings simultaneously with both hands. Omkar Bhave will accompany Teed on tabla.

All proceeds go to the Tibetan Aid Project's effort to produce and distribute thousands of important books to Tibetan refugees throughout Asia, leading not only to increased literacy but also to the strengthening of Tibet's cultural and spiritual heritage.

John Santos with Wayne Wallace and Orestes Vilató **Saturday September 8**

Charismatic bandleader, percussionist extraordinaire, and five-time Grammy nominee John Santos, with stalwarts Wayne Wallace and Orestes Vilató, occupied the pinnacle of Latin jazz in the Bay Area for more than twenty years playing as the Machete Ensemble. These three men know how to make music that rocks, swings, sizzles, and grooves.

Born and raised in San Francisco, John absorbed the musical traditions of his family, rooted in Puerto Rico and Cape Verde. His fascination with Afro-Latin music has taken him to New York, Puerto Rico, Cuba, Brazil, and Colombia. He has excelled not only as a strong band leader and unparalleled percussionist, but also as a composer, producer, writer, and teacher, working with young musicians from Berkeley's Jazzschool to Boston's Berklee College of Music.

Wayne, also a native of San Francisco, is a Grammynominated trombonist, composer, and arranger who has played with Ray Charles, McCoy Tyner, Steve Winwood, and Lena Horne. His playing is melodic, graceful, and full of warmth. Latin Beat Magazine has called Orestes "the most influential Cuban timbalero north of Havana." Born in Camagüey, Cuba, a key player in the rise of East Coast salsa with artists like Rubén Blades, Celia Cruz, Johnny Pacheco, and the Fania All Stars, Orestes came to Northern California as a member of the Santana



band thirty years ago and has been a local treasure as well as an international sensation ever since. If your heart thumps to a Latin beat, don't miss these three giants of jazz.

The Bobs Sunday September 9

Amazing vocal acrobats and perennial Freight favorites, The Bobs-Matthew Bob Stull, Richard Bob Greene, Dan Bob Schumacher, and Angie Bob Doctor—serve up unforgettable performances, outrageous covers of classic songs, and wonderful, witty originals. In shows that are part theater, part comedy, and part performance art, this a cappella "band without instruments" uses voices and body percussion to make music that is hilarious, inspiring, and often beautiful. If you haven't seen them before, think Manhattan Transfer meets Monty Python. Or imagine Jimi Hendrix and George Gershwin jamming with Karl and Groucho Marx.



Formed in the Bay Area in 1981, The Bobs have played everywhere from Lincoln Center to Berlin's Passionkirche, earned four Grammy nominations, and won just about every a cappella award there is to win. They've recorded 15 albums, including Songs at Any Speed and Get Your Monkey Off My Dog, and a DVD, Sign my Snarling Movie: 25 Years of The Bobs, which includes extensive footage of performances at the Freight.

To say that The Bobs have a good sense of humor is a little like saying that LeBron James has a decent move to the hoop. The funny thing is, they're brilliant musicians—who just happen to be certifiable. In the words of comic Paul Provenza, "Some performers are brilliant comedians, some are genius musicians, and some just make you happy to be alive. The Bobs are all of that—and then some." If you've seen them before, you know how much fun this show will be. If you haven't seen them yet, check 'em out. You're in for a treat.

Leftover Dreams

Erik Jekabson's String-tet, Musical Art Quintet opens

Tuesday September 11

With two albums behind him, Berkeley native Erik Jekabson and his Stringtet celebrate the release of their new CD, Anti-Mass, a chamber-jazz concept album inspired by artwork from San Francisco's de Young Museum. Erik is a young trumpeter, composer, and educator, with a sound that Allmusic Guide has described as "a perfect balance between melodic art-



istry and probing, knotty jazz improvisation."

After earning music degrees from Oberlin College and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, he's spent time on the road with Illinois Jacquet, John Mayer, Galactic, and the Howard Fishman Quartet, and has performed at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam, as well as on the *Tonight Show* with Jay Leno. He currently divides his time between leading his own groups, playing and composing for other bands, and teaching at Chabot College, Cal State East Bay, and our neighbor, the Jazzschool.

His masterful String-tet includes Michael Zilber on tenor sax, Mads Tolling on violin, Charith Premawardhana on viola, John Wiitala on bass, Smith Dobson on drums and vibraphone, and Erik himself on trumpet and flugelhorn.

Opening tonight's show are the five extremely talented classical musicians of Musical Art Quintet—Anthony Blea and Jory Fankuchen on violin, Charith Premawardhana on viola, Shain Carrasco on cello, and Sascha Jacobsen on string bass. They play a new genre they call Nuevo Chamber, blending world music with classical, weaving together strands of everything from Argentine tango to Afro-Cuban son, from klezmer to electronica.

Bill Monroe Birthday Tribute with Laurie Lewis

Wednesday September 12

For the third year in a row Laurie Lewis gathers an all-star cast in a rollicking tribute to Bill Monroe who gave bluegrass its name, its distinctive style, and for most of the 20th century embodied the essence of the art form.



Laurie is the perfect host for this event. She won a Grammy for her work on the album True Life Blues: The Songs of Bill Monroe, was twice named International Bluegrass Music Association Female Vocalist of the Year, and has been a local treasure since the mid-70s when she co-founded the groundbreaking bluegrass quintet, the Good Ol' Persons.

An all-star cast of Bay Area bluegrass luminaries will join Laurie on stage. Alice Gerrard has played with Hazel Dickens in Hazel and Alice, as well as with the Strange Creek Singers, and Tom, Brad & Alice. Laurie's long-time collaborator Tom Rozum will add his mandolin mastery, along with Butch Waller of High Country fame. Chad Manning, of the David Grisman Bluegrass Experience and Laurie Lewis and the Right Hands, will play fiddle. Patrick Sauber, another Right Hand, will play banjo. Tony Marcus will serve as master of ceremonies and singer of the lowest bass notes.

Come see some of the brightest lights in bluegrass for this glorious tribute.


Rafe & Clelia Stefanini, the Cheap Suit Serenaders Thursday September 13

The legendary Tennessee buckdancer Thomas Maupin and his group will be returning this year. Festival director Suzy Thompson says, "Thomas has that something extra found in all truly great dancers, where even small movements are invested with deeper meaning." Buckdancing, or flatfooting, is a fluid, loose-





limbed style of percussive dance that is an ancestor of clogging and tap dance. Thomas, now 74, learned buckdancing from his grandmother and says that he has her timing but with flourishes of his own. He'll be dancing along with his grandson Daniel Rothwell, an electrifying performer who tells countrified jokes and



stories and hollers out old time favorites like "Good Old Mountain Dew." Also performing with the group will be 2012 World Champion Buckdancer Jay Bland, who apprenticed with Thomas.

Father-daughter duo Rafe and Clelia Stefanini are among the elite tier of virtuoso fiddlers. Both have won ribbons at Clifftop, old time music's biggest and most prestigious contest. Rafe grew up in Italy, but fell in love with old time music and moved to America in 1983. Clelia learned the fiddle from her father and has established herself at age 22 as one of the strongest young fiddlers in the country. Their music is firmly grounded in tradition, with a repertoire that includes many fiddle and banjo tunes so challenging that they are rarely played today.

Wearing period threads and playing vintage instruments, the Cheap Suit Serenaders serve up a giddy blend of up-tempo Hawaiian stomps, ragtime, Italian polkas, and more, as they recreate the music of the golden age of jazz. In the 1970s, when co-founder R. Crumb was still an active member of the band, they issued three 78-rpm, 10-inch discs, now coveted collectors items, just like the discs they listened to and loved. With Bob Armstrong, Al Dodge, Rick Elmore, Tony Marcus, and (we hope) Terry Zwigoff performing on ukuleles, Hawaiian steel guitars, fiddles, cellos, banjos, mandolins, accordions, and musical saws, the band will bring alive great music and great times.

The 10th annual Berkeley Old Time Music Convention continues with banjo virtuosity, classic country harmony, and rowdy buckdancing.

Old time fiddle and banjo music got a huge boost from the movie *Cold Mountain*, and we're proud to present one of its important musical contributors, North Carolina's Riley Baugus. Riley not only provided the singing voice for the character Pangle, played by Ethan Suplee, but he also hand-crafted the reproductions of Civil War era banjos seen in the film. Appearing with Riley will be the Stuart Brothers, Trevor and Travis, identical twins from Bethel, North Carolina who have brought their music all over America and Europe for the past twenty-five years. Travis plays their great-uncle Austin Starney's banjo, and Trevor follows in the musical footsteps of their fiddling grandfather, the Reverend Henry King, a Methodist preacher, mortician, who loved to stay up all night playing for dances.

In the tiny town of Horsefly, British Columbia, Pharis and Jason Romero build banjos and play guitar and banjo to accompany themselves on the old time songs they love. Their tightly woven harmonies embellish old time country songs about hard living, loss, and love. Their recent album, *A Passing Glimpse*, was the winner of the Americana Album of the Year.

The Stairwell Sisters formed in the hills of San Francisco in 2000. With Lisa Berman on dobro, Evie Ladin on clawhammer banjo, Martha Hawthorne on bass, Stephanie Prausnitz on fiddle, and Sue Sandlin on guitar and tiple, this "all-gal old-time teardown" features intricate instrumentals, hair-raising harmonies, and red-hot buckdancing. They've played everywhere from Scotland to Lincoln Center to Hardly Strictly, and we're pleased to welcome them back to the BOTMC!

Lucy Kaplansky Saturday September 15

Lucy Kaplansky has a voice you won't forget. Clear, pure, and full of tender feeling, it cuts through the noise of the world and pierces you in the heart. Her show tonight promises a rich mix of folk, roots rock, and country, all delivered with great warmth, humor, and intelligence. She's "a truly gifted performer," according to the *New Yorker*, "with a bag of enchanting songs."

Once upon a time, Lucy was a hip kid making the singer-song-writer scene in New York with Suzanne Vega, Cliff Eberhardt, and the late Bill Morrissey. It was easy, the New York Times said, "to predict stardom for her." Then she changed direction, earned a Ph.D. in Psychology, and began working with mentally ill adults. Music kept calling her back, though, in the form of friends who wanted her to



sing on their albums, Shawn Colvin, Nancy Griffith, John Gorka. She went on to record half a dozen outstanding solo albums — Ten Year Night and Every Single Day won Best Pop Album of the Year from the Association For Independent Music—and she also collaborated on two enormously entertaining and popular "super group" projects, Cry, Cry, Cry with Dar Williams and Richard Shindell, and Red Horse with John Gorka and Eliza Gilkyson. Now that Lucy's a mother with a hip kid of her own, her music has deepened and grown more complex. She has a new album, Reunion, due next month, and is headed back into the studio for a second Red Horse collaboration.

Olov Johansson & Catriona McKay Sunday September 16

Sweden meets Scotland in the music of Olov Johansson & Catriona McKay, and the result is "fresh, charming, and dynamic," in the words of music magazine Roots, Rock, Blues, and Beyond. Olov plays the Swedish nyckelharpa, literally key harp, which dates back to 14th century Gotland and is related to the hurdy gurdy. Catriona plays the clarsach, also known as the Celtic harp. In their enchanting new album, Foogy, these two talented instrumentalists bring their musical traditions together in original compositions that feature fast and furious finger-work and leisurely, lyrical passages that linger in the mind long after the song is over.



Olov and Catriona first met backstage at a concert in Stockholm in 2002. He was appearing with Väsen, Sweden's top traditional group, and she was appearing with Fiddler's Bid, which the Scottish Folk Awards named Best Live Act—and named Catriona the Instrumentalist of the Year. After touring Sweden and collaborating on Foogy, they arrive at the Freight for an evening of masterful musicianship and evocative original music that celebrates two rich folk traditions.

Sycamore Slough String Band Wednesday September 19

Brought together by an affinity for the music of the Grateful Dead, the musicians of the Sycamore Slough String Band gathered in an Oakland recording studio early this year to discover where the music would take them, and where they would take the music. One result is their new album, First Rehearsals, "a superb collection of mostly Dead covers," in the words of the Grateful Dead Archive blog. The album "showcases the magic that can happen when fine musicians well-versed in the Dead's unique approach to small group improvisation get together to play their favorite tunes from the Grateful Dead songbook. The band's bluegrass/newgrass arrangements tease out new layers of meaning to chestnuts long familiar to Deadheads, making



this one of the most exciting revisits of Dead music in many years." Another result of those sessions in the studio is this show, which promises to be hugely entertaining for fans of rich, complex music played with know-how and joy.

The band features David Thom on mandolin, guitar, and vocals, Dave Muhlethaler on fiddle, mandolin, and vocals, Roger Sideman on bass and vocals, and David Gans on guitar and vocals, the band boasts four sterling musicians, each with a gift for exploring, jamming, and musical vision.

Sylvia Herold & the Rhythm Bugs Thursday September 20

Sylvia Herold, of Wake the Dead, Cats & Jammers, and Euphonia fame, has been collecting uncommon songs for more than three decades. For her latest album, *The Spider and the Fly*, Sylvia has compiled a selection of swing and early pop tunes that lend themselves to three-part harmony singing. The playful program takes its name—and its spirit—rom the Fats Waller song "The Spider and the Fly," a tale of leggy seduction accented with bug-like vocals. From high-society jazz to low-down Basin Street ballads, the focus is on the elegant vocal arrangements, reminiscent of the Pied Pipers and the Boswell Sisters. Since its release, *The Spider and the Fly* has charted six weeks on the *CMJ* Jazz charts. "A treasure trove of days gone by played by musicians who know how to swing!" says Peter Kuller of *Radio Adelaide*, Australia.



Ed Johnson of Novo Tempo and Jennifer Scott of The Jennifer Scott
Trio join Sylvia as vocal collaborators. These two superb jazz singers bring a wealth of experience
as arrangers and composers to the lighthearted swing and mid-century pop songs on offer. Cary
Black on upright bass and Jason Lewis on drums give the songs legs and make them dance. Jennifer
tinkles the ivories, Ed tickles the guitar strings, and Sylvia thumps a mighty archtop guitar.

Join Sylvia Herold and the Rhythm Bugs for a rollicking jaunt to a bygone era rich in songs of romance and love.

The Blues Broads Tracy Nelson, Dorothy Morrison, Annie Sampson, Angela Strehli & Deanna Bogart Friday September 21



The Blues Broads are the real deal, with deep roots in gospel and rock and roll, country and funk, and most especially the blues. Tracy Nelson co-founded the legendary group Mother Earth and shared the stage with Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, and the Grateful Dead. Dorothy Morrison co-wrote and sang gospel's all-time bestseller, "Oh, Happy Day." She's sung with Van Morrison, Boz Scaggs, and Rita Coolidge. Annie Sampson starred in the original San Francisco production of Hair, cofounded the popular rock group Stoneground, and has recorded with everyone from Elvin Bishop to Sammy Hagar. Angela Strehli came up in the Austin bar scene, learning from such blues greats as Muddy Waters and Stevie Ray Vaughan. Deanna Bogart has played with Joe Louis Walker to Carole King.

The Blues Broads are backed by some of some of the best musicians in the business, Gary Vogensen on guitar, Steve Ehrmann on bass, Mike Emerson on keyboards, and Paul Revelli on drums. All five singers will each take a turn in the spotlight, but it's when they sing together that the whole becomes even greater than the sum of the parts. Don't miss it!

Real Vocal String Quartet Saturday September 22



Choose a box, any box, and the Real Vocal String Quartet will think outside of it. They're a string quartet and a women's vocal quartet. They play Irish fiddle tunes and Brazilian choros, chamber music and wild improvisation. They backed up Feist on her indie-pop hit Metals, and their debut album is a "breathtaking bouquet with one luscious hybrid after another," according to KQED's California Report.

An original member of the famed Turtle Island String Quartet, violinist and vocalist Irene Sazer founded the group with ideal collaborators Alisa Rose on violin and vocals, Dina Maccabee on viola and vocals, and Jessica Ivry on cello and vocals. Irene has played with artists as diverse as Frank Sinatra and Bjork. Alisa is a member of the Quartet San Francisco and has played with Michelle Shocked, Josh Ritter, and Bauhuas. Dina, too, has played with an eclectic mix of performers including Wilco, Donovan, Tin Hat, and Sufjan Stevens, and has composed scores for several San Francisco film makers. Jessica plays with avant-cabaret composer and singer Amy X Neuburg & the Cello ChiXtet and has toured with the Beth Custer Ensemble, singer-songwriter Vienna Teng, and Balkan women's choir Kitka.

The Real Vocal String Quartet brings together a wealth of musical possibilities.

Dirk Hamilton Sunday September 23

Dirk Hamilton is such a prototypical singer-songwriter-guitar player, someone ought to make a movie about him—and in fact Dirk does appear front and center in the upcoming documentary Folk, which examines how three artists at dramatically different stages of their career work to reach an audience. Dirk is well cast as the seasoned vet. He's just released his 17th album, solo mono, which recordnet.com describes as "raw and real." "inventive," and "delicately nuanced," with "a bluesy, contemplative feel." He's bringing his guitar and harmonica to the Freight to play songs from the new album and from his thirty-five years in the music business.

Dirk moved from his hometown of Stockton to Los Angeles in the late 70s and went into the studio with Steely Dan's producer, Gary Katz, who helped him get a deal with ABC Records. Four albums and two record companies later, he returned to Stockton and counseled troubled teens. He was playing for fun in a bar band when the inspiration to write returned. After





Dirk Hamilton has paid his dues. Tonight at the Freight is your chance to reap the reward.


