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of tunes by 1980s new-wave masters The Cars re-imagined with acoustic instrumentation and Kris' luminescent, dreamy voice. A. J. Croce Thursday May 3

A singer-songwriter boasting truly eclectic talents, A.J. Croce is as likely to pull an old boogie woogie piano jam out of his sleeve as he is to offer up a swampy New Orleans funk groove or a fresh and touching original. His first five CD releases each hit the radio charts in a different genre-jazz, americana and blues, adult alternative, the American college radio chart, and the U.S. top 40. Praising A.J.'s most recent album, Cage of Muses, David Wild of Rolling Stone magazine calls him "one of our greatest young songwriters."

After losing his father, multi-platinum recording artist Jim Croce, to a tragic plane crash and his eyesight to a brain tumor, A.J. gradually regained sight in his left eye and came into possession of his father's weathered songbook and guitar. By the age of 16, he was a regular

performer at local nightclubs in San Diego, and he hasn't looked back since then. In addition to radio play and exposure through his exhaustive touring, his songs have traveled to the far reaches of our galaxy on two space shuttle missions. A.J. himself regularly performs with folks like Aretha Franklin, Willie Nelson, and Ray Charles, and his television appearances include The Tonight Show with Jay Leno, Austin City Limits, Late Night with Conan O'Brien, and Entertainment Tonight.

Kathy & Carol Friday May 4

Singers Carol McComb and Kathleen Larisch return to the Freight stage with their gorgeous interpretations of British and Appalachian ballads, country tunes, Carter Family songs, and Carol's timeless originals. The duo's unique sense of harmony is remarkable for its use of shifting intervals, haunting dissonances, and counterpoint, and their a cappella songs send shivers down the spine.

Kathy and Carol began singing together in high school in Southern California, and performed extensively on the folk circuit in the 1960s, sharing stages with the New Lost City Ramblers, Bill Monroe, Phil Ochs, and many more. The duo's self-named 1965

Elektra album remains a timeless tribute to traditional British Isles and American folk music. After decades of pursuing separate careers, the pair reunited their luminous voices in 2005, resumed touring, and released a new CD, Keepsake.

Rahim Alhaj w/ Issa Malluf Saturday May 5

Twice Grammy-nominated oud virtuoso and composer, Rahim Alhai finds in his ancient instrument a unique voice that speaks passionately to contemporary listeners of every musical background. Born in Baghdad, Rahim creates music that delicately combines traditional Iraqi maqamat (melodic modes) with contemporary stylings and influences, translating into intensely lyrical music the suffering, joy, and determination that he has experienced in his life as an Iraqi, a political refugee, and today as an American citizen. His compositions flow gracefully from high-spirited, virtuosic displays to delicately nuanced pieces, establishing new concepts without altering the foundation of traditional Iraqi oud music. Palestinian-American percussionist, Issa Malluf, accompanies tonight's performance.

Rahim studied the oud (six-stringed lute) under famed musicians Munier Bashir and Salim Abdul Kareem at the Institute of Music in Baghdad. Rahim has released several recordings; most recently Little Earth, a selection of duets with far-flung musicians-from guitar master Bill Frisell to Cape Verde vocalist Maria de Barros—united by his unique musical vision.

Gerry Tenney & the Hard Times Orchestra Tuesday May 1

Singer, songwriter, guitarist, mandolinist, and longtime stalwart of the Bay Area music scene, Gerry Tenney honors International Worker Day with an evening of musical commentary on economic downturns and labor struggles. Gerry and his Hard Times Orchestra stitch together songs from Pete Seeger and the New Lost City Ramblers with related traditional and contemporary material, including a wide spectrum of blues, klezmer, bluegrass, rock and roll, and many of Gerry's own songs. Gerry is joined by special guests the World Blues Trio.


Longtime leader of one of the West Coasts's leading klezmer bands, California Klezmer, Gerry also heads the bluegrass/americana band The Lost Tribe. The Hard Times Orchestra backs him tonight.

Kris Delmhorst, Hayward Williams opens Wednesday May 2

Combining a warm, expressive voice, a superb poetic imagination, and an alluring, rootsy mixture of folk, gospel, and country styles, singer-songwriter Kris Delmhorst plays what she describes as "songs with pavement under their feet, dirt under their fingernails, and sometimes out of sight of land altogether." In the decade since she began performing, Kris has made her presence felt on the acoustic music scene, touring the country and winning first place at the 2001 Telluride Bluegrass Festival's prestigious Troubadour Competition and numerous Boston Music Award nominations. Whether she's singing delicate ballads, back-porch foot-stompers,

Session Americana w/ Laura Cortese, Miracle Parade Sunday May 6

Join us for an evening of great songs played by superlative musicians as Boston-based acoustic music collective Session Americana takes the stage. In this intimate yet highly theatrical show, a group of top-notch singer-songwriters come together to swap songs and instruments, inviting the audience to share in their warmth, joy, and camaraderie. With core SA members Ry Cavanaugh, Dinty Child, Billy Beard, and Jim Fitting covering the instrumental front from banjo to guitar to harmonica to drums to pump organ, the show also features special guests Laura Cortese on fiddle and Miracle Parade on bass.

Starting in 2005 with an impromptu jam at a tiny bar in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Session Americana

quickly grew to an New England institution, playing gigs from coffee houses to international festival tents, from Boston's Club Passim to the Galway Arts Festival in Ireland. Along the way, they have won numerous Boston Music Awards, including Best Live Residency in 2011 and Album of the Year for their 2009 release, *Diving for Gold*.

Session Americana's fabulously rich repertoire reflects the diverse backgrounds of its core members. "In addition to new takes on traditional numbers," says Dinty, "we do a fair number of originals and I still get a real kick out of playing unlikely covers with our instrumentation. We have a pretty extensive batch of Prince songs as well as Flaming Lips, Liz Phair, the Beastie Boys, Radiohead, and a hundred more."

Melding the propulsive grace of ancient fiddle styles to open-hearted original pop-flavored songs, violinist and vocalist Laura is one of the most intriguing and versatile musicians in the bountiful New England roots music scene.

Miracle Parade is the alter ego of singer/songwriter/multi-instrumentalist Christopher Pappas, whose music is steeped in low-fi brilliance and ambience.

Four Bitchin' Babes Tuesday May 8

Now how could you go wrong with a group that bills itself as a "Fabulous Female Folkestra." Four singer-songwriters with a knack for catchy hooks and an unerring eye for the absurd range freely across the contemporary American landscape, leaving no icon untoppled. From married life to bad blind dates, from chocolate obsession to botox, no theme that really matters is left unexplored as the Babes bring their witty patter, hip girl-group harmonies, piano, guitars, and an unforgettable wardrobe to bear.

Spotlighting numbers from their recent CD, *Diva Nation*, Sally Fingerett, Debi Smith, Deirdre Flint, and Nancy Moran are endlessly charming, tuneful, and insightful. Join them for an evening of poignant views and unbridled comedic commentary on the joys and dilemmas of everyday life, sure to entertain babes and "man-babes" alike!


Directed by guitarist Paul Mehling (Hot Club of San Francisco), the Gypsy Jazz Ensemble performs jazz in the style of Django Reinhardt's and Stephane Grappelli's Quintet of the Hot Club of France. Following in Stephane and Django's footsteps, the student ensemble plays pumping, infectious rhythms combined with virtuosity, inventiveness, and soul, featuring Hande Erdem and Bobbi Nikles on violin, cellist Gael Alcock, Craig Browning on accordion, Harrison Gold, Tristan Norton, and James Pickrel on guitar, and bassists Mike Sweetland and Rick McFarland.



Directed by bassist Marc van Wageningen, the East Bay Funk Ensemble focuses on the East Bay funk canon, playing the distinctive, rhythm-driven genre of music that emerged out of Bay Areabased bands from the late 1960s to the present. The show includes numbers from the "godfather of soul," James Brown, plus repertoire by noted Bay Area bands including Sly and the Family Stone, Cold Blood, Tower of Power, The Headhunters, Ray Obiedo, and The V.W. Hawaiian Slack Key Guitar Festival Friday May 11



The Freight brims with amazing music and heaps of aloha tonight when we present the Hawaiian Slack Key Guitar Festival, spotlighting *ki ho'alu*, the guitar style that Hawaiian cowboys developed in the 19th century when they loosened their guitar strings (or "slacked" them) to create a deep, resonant sound. The show's producer, Milton Lau, is the genius who organized the first slack key guitar festivals, starting in Honolulu in 1982, as a way to honor the late, legendary guitarist Gabby Pahinui. Tonight's all-star lineup includes Hawaiian music legends **Ledward Kaapana** and **Dennis Kamakahi**, award-winning slack key guitarists **Kawika** and **Palolo Steve**, guitarists and vocalists **Brother Noland** and **LT Smooth**, and special guest **Patrick Landeza**.

One of Hawaii's most beloved traditional artists for over four decades, slack key guitar master Led Kaapana is also accomplished on ukulele, autoharp, bass, and steel guitar, as well as being an extraordinary baritone and falsetto singer. Perhaps most importantly, the man known affectionately as *lima wela* ("hot hand") blends his effortless virtuosity with an infectious joy in performing, a generous spirit, and a rascally sense of humor.

The Reverend Dennis Kamakahi is one of Hawai'i's most prolific and popular songwriters. A multiple Grammy winner and a long-time member of the legendary music group, Sons of Hawai'i, Dennis has seen many of his vivid, romantic compositions, like "Pua Hone" and "Wahine 'Ilikea," become Hawaiian classics.

Brother Noland has been an innovative force in Hawaii's music scene for the past several decades. A popular proponent of "Jawaiian" music—Hawaiian-style reggae—he recently turned toward a more traditional sound.

Rounding out the festival's amazing roster are Kawika (David Kaiupileokalani Kawika), the 2007 Na Hoku Hanohano Slack Key Artist of the year, Kailua resident Leon T spotlighting his velvety vocals and lightning-fast guitar licks, Palolo Steve (AKA Stephen Inglis) whose "Redwood Slack Key" was featured on the Grammy nominated album, *Hawaiian Slack Key Kings Volume 2* in 2009, and Berkeley's own slack key guru and Hawaiian music impresario Patrick.

Berkeley Old-Time Music's *Spring Situation* **Community Open House** Saturday, May 12th noon—4 pm

The Freight joins forces with Berkeley Old-Time Music to host their *Spring Situation* community open house, a free afternoon of old-time stringband picking, singing and dancing, including a family dance (includes instruction for all dances), cabaret-style concert sets, jam sessions and work-shops galore on all manner of making music with people.

Andre Thierry & Zydeco Magic Saturday May 12

When Andre Thierry was three years old, the King of Zydeco—the late great Clifton Chenier—grabbed him by the arms and declared him a future accordion player. Today, Andre is a virtuoso on all types of accordion, a soulful singer, and an exceptional multi-dimensional musician who seamlessly blends old and new. Backed by his smokin band, Zydeco Magic, Andre sets the Freight on fire with an enthralling blend of traditional zydeco music with hip-hop, blues, jazz and rock you bet the dance floor will be open!



Andre grew up in the East Bay deeply immersed in his French Creole heritage, mastering the traditional music of his forebears at the French Creole (La-La) dances his grandparents held at their church

parish, St. Mark's Catholic Church, which featured the best zydeco musicians Louisiana had to offer, including Mr. Chenier. By the age of 12, Andre formed his own band, Zydeco Magic, and started performing all over northern California . . . and the rest is history!

These days, Zydeco Magic includes Eric "Kenya" Baker on guitar, Jahon Pride on bass, Ruben Moreno on rubboard, and Tawan Bradford on drums, as featured on Andre's most recent release, *Andre Thierry and Zydeco Magic LIVE*!

Michael Tisserand, author of definitive history The Kingdom of Zydeco, wrote, "Now the California scenes rival anything back home in Louisiana, and that's due to players like Andre Thierry, a standard bearer for the new generation. Thierry is among the best of both the West Coast and the Gulf Coast, and he combines youthful vigor with a mature appreciation for his inherited tradition."

Kathy Kallick Sunday May 13, 1 pm

Kathy Kallick's Mother's Day concert, a (nearly) annual tradition for more than 20 years, will put a song in your heart and a smile on your face, with a flower for every mother and a grand finale extravaganza where Kathy invites all the kids on stage to dance and sing along!

The performance spotlights wonderful original songs from Kathy's two award-winning albums of music for children and families—*Use A Napkin (Not Your Mom)* and *What Do You Dream About?*—as well as some new songs developed for this event.

In addition to being an award-winning songwriter, vocalist, and band leader, Kathy is the mother of two girls, and today she's backed by an all-parent, all-star band: Keith Little (banjo), Tom Bekeny (man-

dolin), Suzy Thompson (fiddle, accordion), and Steve Pottier (acoustic bass). They'll perform hilarious songs about smelly feet and old time fast foods, garbage men and other heroes. Don't miss it!

Barbara Dane's 85th Birthday Concert Sunday May 13

Barbara Dane is a true institution in the universe of jazz, blues, and folk music. Barbara first came to wide public attention performing with the likes of Jack Teagarden, Louis A r m s t r o n g, Memphis Slim, and Muddy Waters in the late



1950s and early '60s, when *Time* magazine said she had "a voice as pure, rich, and rare as a 20 karat diamond."

Barbara never wavered in her commitment to work in the movements for peace and justice, taking her songs to gatherings of people everywhere from the Mississippi Freedom Schools to the GI movement against the Vietnam War, and to Cuba as the first U.S. singer to tour there after the revolution. Barbara puts it all in perspective when she talks about the roots of her music and activism: "(These songs) were given to the world in the spirit of turning madness into sanity, pain into joy, bondage into freedom, and enmity into unity."

Join Barbara tonight as she celebrates her 85th birthday with a memorable performance ranging through her lifetime of work.

West Coast Songwriters Competition Monday May 14, 7:30 pm

Check out the future when the West Coast Songwriters presents its monthly Songwriter Competition, where members take the stage and perform their material. Performers sign up from 7:00 to 7:20, and at 7:30 the show's on! Guest judges award a "Best Song" and "Best Performance." The most active songwriting organization in the United States, WCS is dedicated to providing opportunities, and tools to nurture and promote songwriters.

Sam Rudin Band Thursday May 17

An exciting, high-energy performer, Sam Rudin attacks and caresses the keyboard with great rhythmic intensity, romping through a broad range of 20th century American music.



A compelling vocalist whose rough-hewn voice brims with drama and humor, he can evoke the spirit of Fats Waller, Oscar Peterson, Mose Alison, and Jerry Lee Lewis—sometimes all at the same time. Lee Hildebrand (*East Bay Express*) describes Sam as "A master of musical *americana* whose his scope is near limitless".

Sam brings with him a band featuring some of California's most gifted musicians. Danny Caron (guitar), George Brooks (sax), Steve Evans (bass), and Jimmy Hobson (drums) all have extensive careers working with national and international names in blues, jazz, and world music, and all of them played on Sam's new CD, Once or Twice a Week.

Bill Kirchen and Too Much Fun Friday May 18

Come hitch a ride to honky-tonk heaven with Bill Kirchen, as the "Titan of the Telecaster" and his band Too Much Fun perform old favorites and newly penned originals, including selections from Word to the Wise, his 2010 all-star duet CD. With his scorching guitar runs and elegant twang, Bill celebrates an American tradition where country music draws upon its origins in blues and bluegrass, and in the western swing of Texas and California honky-tonks, infusing rockabilly music with an irresistible blend of hard-core devotion and flat-out fun. A great showman as well as one of the hottest guitar-slingers ever to blow the roof off the Freight, he is someone you definitely should not miss.


Bill first gained renown as lead guitarist for Commander Cody & his Lost Planet Airmen, the renegade country-rock band that tuned in a whole generation to the joys of unvarnished rockabilly music. It was Bill's Telecaster guitar that drove "Hot Rod Lincoln" onto the Top Ten single recording charts in 1972.

Bill's band, Too Much Fun, plus special guest keyboardist Austin de Lone, join Bill as he continues to polish his reputation as one of America's premier roots-rock musicians, rousing that rebel rockabilly trucker that slumbers deep inside us all.

Spanish Gypsy flamenco legend Manuel Agujetas is an outstanding, controversial singer, anarchic and unpredictable, with a vocal style that a Village Voice writer memorably described as "a well-modulated primal scream—an exquisitely controlled shriek of anguish and despair . . . it does have a sheer animal quality to it".

Born Manuel de los Santos Pastor in Jerez de la Frontera in 1939, Agujetas is one of the most important figures in the history of flamenco. Heir to the Spanish Gypsy tradition of singing blacksmiths, Agujetas worked in his father's forge until 1970, when he made his first recording. He has achieved international recognition for his singing of the stunningly

intense form of flamenco, cante jondo (deep song), which includes flamenco's purest, ancient styles such as martinetes and siguiriyas. He appears in Carlos Saura's film Flamenco and in Dominique Abel's documentary Agujetas, Cantaor.

In this fundraiser for the Bay Area Flamenco Festival, the superb young Gypsy guitarist Manuel Valencia of Jerez de la Frontera accompanies Agujetas' cante. A student of both maestro Manuel Morao and Gerardo Núñez, Valencia is the nephew of the legendary late flamenco cantaor, Terremoto. Tonight's show also features flamenco dancer Ikeda Kanako



Wavy Gravy inspires both laughter and reflection in his multifaceted roles as clown, prankster, and activist for peace. The founder of Camp Winnarainbow, the Seva Foundation, and the Hog Farm, an activist commune, Wavy was also the official clown of the Grateful Dead.

Jonathan Richman, founder of the proto-punk band the Modern Lovers, has built a remarkably loyal international audience through his tireless touring. His deceptively straightforward songs embody timeless qualities of humanity, emotional insight and a boundless sense of humor, untainted by cynicism or transient hipness.

Co-founder of Country Joe and the Fish, guitarist, singer, and songwriter Barry "The Fish" Melton is also a founding member of The Dinosaurs, a Bay Area psychedelic supergroup of 1960s musical veterans. His band features bassist Peter Albin (Big Brother and the Holding Company), guitarist Michael Hinton (Merl Saunders Band), drummer Roy Blumenfeld (The Blues Project), and Banana (Youngbloods) on keyboards and vocals.

Chicago-born Nick Gravenites appears on some 40 albums as singer, songwriter, guitarist, and producer, working with Janis Joplin, Pure Prairie League, and blues giants Howlin' Wolf, Otis Rush, and James Cotton.



Noam Pikelny & friends Wednesday May 23

Banjo whiz Noam Pikelny takes his instrument to new levels of intensity, incorporating contemporary elements with a classic old-time drive. His extraordinary playing has most recently made waves in envelopepushing *americana* chamber group the Punch Brothers, as well as on his solo projects like the recent CD, *Beat the Devil & Carry a Rail*.

After stints with Leftover Salmon and the John Cowen Band, in 2006 he joined Chris Thile of Nickel Creek in forming the forward-thinking string quintet the Punch Brothers. In 2010 Noam won the inaugural Steve Martin Prize for Excellence in Banjo and Bluegrass, and he made a memorable appearance on the *Late Show* with David Letterman, playing a comedic version of "Dueling Banjos" alongside Martin.

In the words of legendary banjo player Bela Fleck, "He's already bet-

ter than most banjo payers on the planet, but where he could go is what becomes very interesting." Find out tonight, when Noam makes his Freight debut ably accompanied by Aoife O'Donovan (vocals), Chris Eldridge (guitar), Luke Bulla (fiddle), Dominick Leslie (mandolin), and Sam Grisman (bass)!

Suzy Thompson & Del Rey, Johnny Nicholas & Hell Bent w/ Cindy Cashdollar Thursday May 24

All fans of blues, swing, and all manner of hokum should make tracks to the Freight for tonight's show!

Blueswomen Suzy Thompson and Del Rey, musical friends for nearly two decades, rock out on blues, swing, novelty numbers, and more. A vital member of the Bay Area acoustic music scene, Suzy's exuberant fiddling and vocals have graced



bands like the California Cajun Orchestra and the Bluegrass Intentions. A first-rate musician and vocalist, Seattle-based Del delivers complex guitar grooves on her resonator parlor guitar, plus sly humor and some really fabulous outfits.

For over four decades, Johnny Nicholas' consummate musicianship and vocal skills have graced recordings and performances with blues, *americana*, and roots legends including Mississippi Fred McDowell, Robert Lockwood Jr., Big Walter Horton, and Roosevelt Sykes. He was a lead vocalist and multi-instrumentalist with Asleep at the Wheel when they won their first Grammy award.

Johnny's band, Hell Bent, features Bruce Hughes, Scrappy Jud Newcomb, and John Chipman, with leading Austin-based dobro and steel guitarist Cindy Cashdollar, a master of bluegrass, gutbucket blues, swampy R&B, and honky tonk.

Loudon Wainwright III Friday May 25

One of this country's most astute commentators in any medium, Loudon Wainwright III has been sharing his beautifully crafted songs with us since the late 1960s. A superb lyricist who balances the unflinching honesty and powerful emotions of his autobiographical musings with a knack for pulling the rug out from under his own pretensions, Loudon "wrings more human truth out of his contradiction than any other songwriter of his generation," in the words of *New York Times* music critic Stephen Holden. The veteran singer-songwriter's 2010 CD, *High Wide & Handsome: The Charlie Poole Project*, won the Grammy Award for Best Traditional Folk Album. His most recent release is *Older Than My Old Man Now*.

In addition to his music, you probably know Loudon's face from the airwaves—he's acted on numerous television programs, from *MASH* to *Parks & Recreation*—or from the silver screen, where he appeared in *Big Fish*, *The 40 Year Old Virgin* and *Knocked Up*, and others.

Pierre Bensusan Saturday May 26

Since the mid-1970s Pierre Bensusan's name has been synonymous with contemporary acoustic guitar genius. Working in open tuning with his steel strings tuned to the modal, mystical-sounding DADGAD, Pierre is a composer, singer, and acoustic guitar visionary of passionate intensity with an extraordinarily tender, joyful touch. His unique musical sensibility combines ethnic folk themes and classical melodies as well as free and fusion styles with Latin and North African rhythms and vocals in the world jazz scat tradition that evoke comparisons to Brazilian maestro, Milton Nascimento.

Born in Algeria and raised in Paris, Pierre won the Grand Prix at the 1976 Montreux Festival when he was 18 years old with his first recording, *Pres de Paris*. Since then, he has toured throughout

the world and released numerous albums, including his recent CD, *Vividly* showcasing his rich and multi-cultural world.

Abraham Lincoln Brigade Celebration Sunday May 27, 2 pm

In this special afternoon performance the Abraham Lincoln Brigade Archives (ALBA) celebrates the 76th reunion of the Lincoln Brigade, Americans who volunteered to fight against Franco's fascists in the Spanish Civil War. Guest speaker **Kate Doyle**, 2012 recipient of the ALBA/Puffin Human Rights Award, discusses genocide and justice in Guatemala. The program also includes an update on former Spanish judge Baltasar Garzón, an outspoken champion of human rights. Musicians **Bruce Barthol, Velina Brown, Randy Craig, Tony Marcus**, and **Barrett Nelson** perform songs of the Spanish Civil War, with images of courage and resistance from **Richard Bermack**, documentary photographer and author of *The Front Lines of Social Change: Veterans of the Abraham Lincoln Brigade*.


